Capital Letters



Capital letters are used in a variety of ways. Usually, capital letters are used when the meaning is specific and lowercase letters are used when the meaning is general. Below are rules for when to use capital letters.

First word of a sentence:

Always capitalize the first letter of the word in a sentence.

Proper nouns:

Always capitalize names of specific people and places such as *J*essica and *M*ic *M*ac *M*all. Also, always capitalize names of organizations like Saint Mary's University.

Titles of people when their name is included:

Prime Minister Stephen Harper

Countries, nationalities, and languages: Japan, Canadian, Latin

Geographic locations: I live in the *M*aritimes.

Week days, months, and holidays: Monday, January, Christmas

Periods and events in history:

The War on T error began with the 9/11 attacks.

Titles and headings:

This includes: titles of essays, films, books, newspapers, and poems.

Opening and closing remarks of a letter:

Best, Sincerely, Cheers

Specific courses: *T*he *M*odern *N*ovel is an excellent course.
